This Inventory, compiled by the Herefordshire Family History Society (J.A. Golding) is based on the Anglican parishes for Herefordshire listed within “Parish Registers for Herefordshire” (published © 1987 & 1988 by The Friends of Hereford Record Office, edited by Mr John Harnden, B.Sc. That publication also notes townships and chapelries, and links some of the smaller places to a well known village or town, which has been continued in this document. Local Trade Directories have also been used extensively as well as word-of-mouth, etc. At the end of this document the Acknowledgement section provides some other sources.

According to the 1901 census “the ancient county of Herefordshire covered 537,363 acres with 223 ecclesiastical Church of England Parishes in the county.” By the late 20th century there are approximately 277 CE parishes, including ‘modern’ churches post 1848. That number does not include mission rooms or where two churches of differing names appear in one parish; the assumption being one replaced the other until a site visit can be made to confirm such, and therefore there may be some duplication within this document. To-date we have noted there are 334 burial sites of all denominations.

Adjacent to the parish title, within this document, can be found the Hundred (as the main unit of local government between county and parish) and then the Herefordshire Deanery (initially for 16-19th Century, then from ca1898 onwards in brackets).

The Author created for this document short-form/codes (and used in the indexes), for religious denomination (ratified by the Federation of Family History Societies during the 1990s); also parish reference codes, monumental inscription commencement dates, Ordnance Survey reference, etc.

Cut off date for recording memorials is mainly 31st December 1949, although some later dates may be found indicated by ‘ca1949’.

RELIGIOUS BELIEF DESCRIPTIONS

The following brief descriptions of each religious belief have been gleaned from many sources on the Internet, including Wikipedia; and www.religionfacts.com/Christianity/denominations/⁽¹⁾, and will be added to as and when. Anyone knowing different or more correct information please contact the author of this document.

¹The first division within Christendom came in 1054 with the 'Great Schism' between the Western Church and the Eastern Church. From then on there were two large branches of Christianity, which became known as the Catholic Church (in the west) and the Orthodox Church (in the East). / The next major division occurred in the 16th century with the Protestant Reformation. The Reformation was famously sparked when Martin Luther (a German Monk) posted his 95 Theses in 1517, but "Protestantism" [*refer to Lutheran below*] as a movement officially began in 1529. That year marked the publication of the 'Protestation,' directed at the imperial government. The authors, German princes who wanted the freedom to choose the faith of their territory, protested that "in matters which concern God's honour & salvation and the eternal life of our souls, everyone must stand up and give account before God for himself." / With its emphasis on individual interpretation of scripture and a measure of religious freedom, the Reformation marked not only a break between Protestantism and Catholicism, but the beginning of denominationalism as we know it today. This historical perspective is perhaps the best way to make sense of the initially astounding variety of Christian denominations. / Those who remained within the fold of Roman Catholics argued that central regulation of doctrine is necessary to prevent confusion and division within the church and corruption of its beliefs. Those who broke away from the church, on the other hand, insisted that it was precisely this policy of control that had already led to corruption of the true faith. They demanded that believers be allowed to read the Scriptures for themselves (it was previously available only in Latin) and act in accordance with their conscience. This issue of religious authority continues to be a fundamental difference in perspective between Catholic and Orthodox Christians on one hand, and Protestant Christian the other. / As the Reformation developed in Germany, various groups in other parts of Europe also began to break away from the Catholic Church. Reformed Christianity developed in Switzerland based on the teachings of Ulrich Zwingli and John Calvin. When it spread to Scotland under John Knox, the Reformed faith became Presbyterianism. Switzerland was also the birthplace of the 'Anabaptists', spiritual ancestors of today's Amish, Mennonites, Quakers and Baptists. Anglicanism was established in 1534 when England's King Henry VIII broke from the authority of the Pope, and became Episcopalianism in America. Methodism, based on the teachings of John Wesley also has roots in Anglicanism.

Anabaptists

One who denies the validity of infant baptism and maintains that re-baptism of adults (by immersion) is necessary; originally a member of a fanatical sect of Protestants in Saxony in 16th century formed by Menno Simons from Friesland.

Anchorites

One who lives apart from others, renouncing the world for religious reasons; a recluse. Anchoress/ancress/anchorites, a female hermit. Ancrene Wisse wrote early in the thirteenth century.

Anglican

Refer to Church of England. ⁽¹⁾ Anglicanism of Episcopalianism in the general form of doctrine, worship and structure based on the tradition of the Church of England. Anglicans are not subject to the Pope and are Protestant in most areas of doctrine, but Anglicans also retain many catholic forms of worship, including a hierarchy based on bishops (which is the meaning of the word 'episcopalian').

Apostolic

Church derived from, and incorporating the spirit of, the apostles. "Fundamentalists, believing in the verbal inspiration of Holy Scripture, and having a marked interest in the prophecies of Daniel and the Apocalypse. Baptism by immersion, in the name of Father, Son and Holy Ghost, and make the Breaking of Bread the chief act of worship." [in quotes extracted from *The Town in the Marches* by Norman C. Reeves and published by the Orphans Press approximately 1988 ©]

Armenian / Arminian Methodist : [refer to 'Methodist'].

Associate Presbytery : [no information currently].

Augustinian Monk

Relating to St. Augustine or his doctrines, *n.* a believer in St. Augustinian theology; a member of the Augustine monastic order. Augustine, *n.* a member of a monastic order which follows rules framed by St. Augustine (394-430) or deduced from his writings; a black friar.

Baptist (general)

Some of the following is extracted from © 2007 from website "Baptists [who we are]" (<http://www.Baptist.org.uk/Baptists/index.html> - remove spaces from within the afore-going web address).

Evangelical in doctrine and Reformed in worship. Baptist churches are found in almost every country in the world. As part of the world-wide Christian church, Baptists form one of the largest families of faith, alongside other Trinitarian Christian traditions such as Anglicans, Methodists, Reformed, etc.

"For Baptists the concept of a family is important. Evangelical in doctrine and Reformed in worship. The church is not so much a particular place or building, but rather a family of believers, committed to Christ, to one another and to the service of God in the world. In this Baptist family everybody is equal, for everybody has a part to play in the service of God. Equality of status, however, does not mean that all have the same role. There is no hierarchy of bishops or priests exercising authority over their members, although each local Baptist church appoints its own leaders - or ministers - to have particular responsibility for preaching, teaching and pastoral care. Working alongside these ministers are also deacons, who together with the minister(s) form the leadership team of the local Baptist church. Therefore, a wide range of beliefs can be seen between one Baptist Church and another. The rite of initiation is duly administered only by immersion and to those who are of age to make an intelligent profession of faith. Benedictine Monk.

Benedictine, adjective: pert. To St. Benedict or his monastic order (a saint ca480-549, founder of Western monachism, the first Benedictine monastery being built at Monte Cassino, Italy); noun: a Black Friar, one who professes to follow the rules of St. Benedict.

(1815-1907)

Brethren : [refer to Plymouth Brethren?]

Calvinistic / Calvinistic Welsh / Calvinistic Methodist : [refer to 'Methodist']

Cameronians

1690-1743. Presbyterian body in Scotland in the 17th century, followers of the Covenanter, Richard Cameron.

Campbellites

Evangelical Christians.

Carmelite

A mendicant monk, of the Carmelite order. [Mendicant: adjective: begging; living as a beggar; noun: a beggar, who lives by alms].

Catholic : Refer to Roman Catholic, Church of England.

Christadelphians

A Christian denomination who are non-trinitarianism, i.e. rejecting the doctrine that God is three distinct persons in one being (the trinity) in their beliefs. God is the Creator of all things and the father of true believers. God is a separate being from his son, Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit is not a person, but the power of God used in creation and for salvation, and at certain times in history has been given to certain believers for specific purposes. Baptism is at an age when actions are understood and believers are expected to live a life consistent with Bible teaching. Developed in the United Kingdom and North America in the 19th Century the Christadelphians base beliefs wholly on the Bible. The originator was London-born John Thomas, MD, 1805-1871, who emigrated to America in 1832. After joining a group of evangelical Christians, the Campbellites, he disagreed with their beliefs and pursued his own study of the Bible. He arrived at his unique interpretation of various Bible doctrines by about 1848 and attracted a small group of followers who were, at first, known as Thomasites. The name now is coined from the two Greek words Christou and Adelphoi, meaning Christ's brethren.

Christian Bretheren : [refer to Plymouth Brethren?]

Christian Science

Episcopalian

(adjective): Of an Episcopal system or church; (noun): a member or adherent of an Episcopal church. [government of a church by bishops].

Evangelical

The chapels encourage the participation of all their members, the "church" is seen as a body of believers, saved by grace through a personal experience of Christ, i.e. "being born again". Consonant with the Gospel; contained in or relating to the four gospels; applied to those forms of Christianity which regard the atonement of Christ as the ground and central principle of the Christian faith. Baptism is by immersion, and a simple remembrance of the breaking of bread. The Bible is the sole authority of faith and the basis for belief. Their primary appeal was to the labouring classes, and to the rising middle classes, particularly some of the industrialists. ["Lugwardine in the 19th Century" published 1988 © by the Lugwardine Historical Society, Herefordshire, extract from page 52].

Evangelical Free Church

Identifies with Evangelical Christians accepting the revelation of the triune God given in the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments and confessing the historic faith of the Gospel therein set forth. They here assert doctrines which are regarded as crucial to the understanding of the faith, and which should issue in mutual love, practical Christian service and evangelistic concern. The following is based on the Evangelical Alliance Basis of faith: (1). The divine inspiration of Holy Scripture and its consequent entire trustworthiness and supreme authority in all matters of faith and conduct. (2). The sovereignty and grace of God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit in creation, providence, revelation, redemption and final judgment. (3). The universal sinfulness and guilt of fallen man, making him subject to God's wrath and condemnation. (4). The substitutionary sacrifice of the incarnate Son of God as the sole and all-sufficient ground of redemption from the guilt and power of sin, and from its eternal consequences. (5). The justification of the sinner solely by the grace of God through faith in Christ crucified and risen from the dead. (6). The illuminating, regenerating, indwelling and sanctifying work of God the Holy Spirit. (7). The priesthood of all believers, who form the universal church, the Body of which Christ is the Head, and which is committed by His command to the proclamation of the Gospel throughout the world. (8). The expectation of the personal, visible return of the Lord Jesus Christ, in power and glory.

Franciscan

The Italian saint, Francis of Assisi founded in 1210 an order of friars who, vowing themselves to a life of service and poverty, did much to restore the spiritual life of Europe in the 13th century.

Free Christian or Free Church of England

Free Church of England - a small Protestant body, formed in 1863, which however accepted the 39 Articles and recognised the legitimacy of the Episcopacy. A church not connected with the State; in England, the Reformed Episcopal Church established in the middle of the 19th century, in Scotland, that section of the Presbyterian Church which seceded from the Established Church after 1843 (the Disruption); the minority group which, in 1900, refused to join the United Presbyterians in the United Free Church; the group of U.F. Church members who, in 1929, refused to recognise the reuniting of the Established and U.F. Churches.

Friars : refer to Augustinian (Black); Franciscan (Grey); Carmelite (White).

Gospel

Glad tidings; the revelation of the Christian faith; the story of Christ's life and sayings as set down in the first four books of the New Testament; the part of these read at service; doctrine.

Grandmontine

Founded by Benedictines (at Craswall, Hef in 1222 by Roger de Lacy) as a cell in connexion with the foreign abbey of Grandmont in Normandy. It was suppressed, along with other alien priories, in the reign of Edward IV.

Greek Orthodox

That section of the Church which separated from the Roman church in 1054, after disputes as to the Roman primacy and certain points of doctrine. (¹) Variety of religions of ancient Greeks. Human life is subject to the whim of gods and to Fate; these can be controlled through sacrifice and divination.

Hearers & Followers of the Gospel : no information currently

Huguenot

Name used in France for those who joined the Reformation; a 16th century French Protestant; a Calvinist.

Independent (Congregationalists)

Early Congregationalists were called Separatists or Independents to distinguish themselves from the similarly Calvinistic Presbyterians. The reforms advocated a return to the simplicity and sincerity they saw described in the New Testament Church.

Islam

Jehovah's Witness

Jewish

A Hebrew or an Israelite.

Lutheran

Founded by Martin Luther, a German monk in 1517. He protested against the Catholic Church selling indulgences. He stressed the doctrine of justification by faith alone and the authority of the scripture alone*. The Lutheran denomination is the oldest Protestant denomination. *Salvation comes from the grace of God and faith in Christ above. Mostly found in German, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Iceland & Finland.

Marion Fathers

A Polish clerical religions congregation.

Mennonites

A member of a Protestant sect founded at Zurich about 1535, with a creed combining tenets of the Baptists with those of the Quakers. From Menno Simons, the founder.

Methodism

[gleaned from various sources including Extracts © 2007 from website the "Methodist Archives and Research Centre at Manchester (<http://rylibweb.man.ac.uk/data1/dg/methodist/methchap.html>)]. Originating in the 1730's by Charles and John Wesley as a revivalist movement within the Church of England among the followers of the great preacher John Wesley who spoke in the open air and refused to be bound by the parish system. The group broke away from the Anglicans in 1795, attracting support in the new industrial cities. The church soon became central to working-class politics, with its preachers prominent in the Chartist movement and among leaders of the growing trade unions. The early Methodists attended the local Anglican Church for formal worship and held meetings of their own in private houses for prayer and fellowship. Within a few years in the larger towns and cities, buildings were being acquired for dedicated use as a chapel or 'Preaching House.' The first was opened at the New Room in Bristol in 1739.

In the nineteenth century Methodism split into several bodies, all independent of each other, with separate records. All these bodies operated the circuit system, rather than the individual chapel, where chapels and preaching places were grouped for ministerial oversight, with a minister being responsible for several chapels. Often several different branches of Methodism would be represented in the same town or village, each with its own chapel, for example:-

Armenian / Arminian Methodist (16th century Dutch) - A follower of Arminius, the 16th century Dutch theologian who, denying the Calvinistic doctrine of predestination, asserted the free-will of man in the matter of personal salvation. In England, unlike Wales, the great numerical preponderance of the Arminian Methodists has almost caused the existence of other kinds of Methodism to be forgotten. The amalgamation of almost all the Arminian Methodists into 'The Methodist Church' in 1930 has given the followers of John Wesley a monopoly of the title, and the fact that the only remaining English organisation of Calvinistic Methodists calls itself the Countess of Huntingdon's connexion has concealed the existence of other kinds of Methodism.

Calvinistic Methodists (17th C): The doctrines of John Calvin, a Genevan Protestant Reformer (1509-64), which lay special stress on the sovereignty of God in all things in the conferring of grace. Because of John Calvin's great influence and role in the confessional and ecclesiastical debates throughout the 17th Century, the tradition generally became known as Calvinism.

Countess of Huntingdon: In 1760 Selina Dowager Countess of Huntingdon, took the first steps which led to the establishment of her Connexion in the south of England. She had been a supporter of the Methodists since her conversion in 1739 and at that time had tried to encourage preaching on her husband's estates in north-west Leicestershire. However, until 1760 most of her time had been devoted to her children and the management of the family estates. When freed from these cares she began to take a more active part in evangelisation again. The first Methodist society she established was at Brighton in 1760, with others following on, and her Connexion remained distinct from both Whitefield's Connexion in England and the Welsh Calvinistic Methodists. In 1768 she established her College to train evangelical ministers in Wales.

Wesleyan Methodists (1790-1932): The religious body founded on the death of John Wesley (1703-1791) to disseminate his doctrines, i.e. a religion practised in a methodical manner.

'Other segments' are: Wesleyan Association (1835-57); Wesleyan Unitarian Movement (1806-1857); Wesleyan Reformers (1847-1857); Wesleyan Methodist Reformed Union (1849); Wesleyan Methodist Welsh (dates unknown); Methodist New Connexion (1797-1907); Welsh Methodist (dates unknown); Scotch Wesleyan Methodist (dates unknown); Wesleyan Association (1835-57); Protestant Methodist (dates unknown); United Methodists (1907-32); United Methodist Free (1857-1907).

Primitive Methodists (1810-1932) a religious body, which seceded from the Wesleyan Methodists in 1810, but reunited with them in 1932 and from that date the Primitive Methodist church ceased to exist as a separate body when it joined the Wesleyan Methodist and the United Methodist to form the "The Methodist Church."

Methodist Church (from 1932): Decreases in membership during the twentieth century and the union of the major Methodist denominations in 1907 and 1932 combined with demographic change to produce a large number of redundant chapels. Such buildings have often been demolished or converted to other uses.

Deposited at the John Rylands University Library of Manchester is a wealth of information created by the Church which complement locally kept records*. The collection at the Methodist Archive is the largest in Britain and is representative of every Methodist denomination and most circuits, but it is not comprehensive.

Glos R.O (via Glos FHS Journal March 1993): Ledbury & Forest of Dean existed from 1850. By 1861 called the Ross and Coleford circuit, but by 1878 became the Cinderford Wesleyan Circuit.

Moravian

Originated in Moravia and Bohemia (now known as the Czech Republic). One of an evangelical sect of Hussites, founded in the 15th century. The official title for the Church is Unitas Fratrum (Unity of Brethren). The first Moravian congregation was established in England in 1742. In 1749 the Moravian Church was recognised by Act of Parliament. The Moravian Church holds that there is no Head of the Church other than Jesus Christ and it is this Christ-centred-ness that informs worship and common life. Ecumenical in outlook and practice, Moravians practice either infant or adult baptism and accept it as the initiation ceremony into the Christian community. JH/Faraday "The congregation of the Moravian United Brethren in connexion with the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United Brethren was founded in 1759.

Moslem / Muslim : refer to Islam

Pentecostal

Pentecost is a Jewish festival celebrated on the 50th day after the second day of the Passover in commemoration of the giving of the law on Sinai.

Pentecostal is Greek for fiftieth.

Plymouth Brethren

John Nelson Darby (1800-82), Edward Cronin, John Bellett and Francis Huthinson met in the latter's house in Dublin 1827/8 and rejected an ecclesiastical arrangement, preferring a return to a lifestyle based purely on New Testament teaching, they were simply referred to as the Brethren. It was deeply rooted in

Augustinian Theology and the Jesuit futuristic 'rapture' theory. By 1829 the first permanent meetings had been held although there were no headquarters, its founder, ordained as a deacon in 1825 in the Irish Church, needed a freer sphere of action. He found it in Plymouth, where his evangelical preaching attracted large numbers. The disciples of Darby formed a separate group in Plymouth, and so acquired the popular names of Plymouth Brethren or Darbyites. Early in their history a rift among them led to the formation of two groups, the 'Open' and the 'Exclusive' Brethren. The 'Brethren' stands for a simple world-renouncing piety, regard the Bible as infallible, are called upon to live a good life in according with its instructions, expect a speedy return of Christ, have no ordained ministry, and make the 'Breaking of Bread' their weekly act of worship. A key doctrine of the Brethren, and one that arouses some negative comment, is that of Separation. The Brethren 'make a commitment to eat and drink only with those with whom we would celebrate the Lord's Supper.' They also shun technology, and TV and radio is forbidden in the house as it may bring in harmful information. [extracts from a variety of sources, including *The Town in the Marches* by Norman C. The doctrine and principles of Robert Sandeman (1718-1771), a Scottish divine who as co-founder of the Glassites, practised community of property, abstinence from certain kinds of flesh food, weekly celebration of Communion, and the holding of 'love feasts'.

Seven-day Adventists

Rooted in Millerite Movement; founded 1843 in New England, USA, early leaders were Ellen White, Hiram Edson, Joseph Bates. One God who is a Trinity of Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Society of Friends/ Quaker

"In 1620 a small body of religious dissenters (often known as The Pilgrim Fathers) who had gone to Holland to escape persecution, sailed to America in the 'Mayflower'. Called 'Seekers' there was initially no cohesion and no leader until the arrival of George FOX in 1652. In May of that year he was in Lancashire and climbed to the top of Dindle Hill, near Clitheroe, the view inspired him and shortly after he had a vision, or an insight, of 'a great people to be gathered'. The really significant visit, one to have far reaching and permanent effects on the history of Quakerism was to Swarthmore Hall, near Ulverston - a large house and property occupied by Judge Fell and his wife Margaret. Both were of a liberal outlook in religious matters and visiting preachers had already been made welcome there. For many years, right up to the death of George Fox, Swarthmore Hall was the 'Headquarters' or 'Powerhouse' of the Quaker movement and from whence the early Quaker 'missionaries' were sent in small groups of two or more to spread the message in different parts of the country.

The Purists aimed at a regeneration not only of religion, but also of morals and behaviour, it was only later that this developed into political resistance to the established church. 'Separatists' refers more to groups of free-thinking people than to any organised movement, including Anabaptists or Mennonites.

Among these 'people to be gathered' what there was in common was a spiritual religion, rather than the religion of conformity under Queen Elizabeth I and the early Stuarts. There was resentment against ecclesiastical authority and so a readiness to listen to Fox's assurance that there was only one authority - namely Christ himself; and that this authority was to be known directly in the human heart. Although peaceable they were not 'quiet', many spoke long and loud; they were full of confidence that they possessed the 'Truth of God'. The message centred on the basic 'Christ had come to teach his people himself' (a message of hope). The Purists aimed at a regeneration not only of religion, but also of morals and behaviour, it was only later that this developed into political resistance to the established church. 'Separatists' refers more to groups of free-thinking people than to any organised movement, including Anabaptists or Mennonites.

Swedenborgian

A believer in the doctrines expounded by Emanuel Swedenborg (1688-1772) in the latter part of his life; a member of the New Jerusalem Church founded in London in 1789 by readers of his writings.

Unitarian

One who rejects the doctrine of the Trinity, asserts the unipersonality of God, and accepts the preminence of Jesus Christ as a teacher.

United Brethren

A religious sect founded in Moravia in the 15th century, later establishing still existing churches in Britain and America.

United Churches of Christ : no information currently

United Free Church (Scot) The church formed in 1900 by the union of the Free and United Presbyterian Churches; later in 1929, joined with Church of Scotland, except those members forming the body called United Free Continuing Church.

United Presbyterians (Scot)

A religious body formed in 1847 by the union of the Secession and Relief Churches, later, in 1900, joining with the Free Church to form the United Free Church of Scotland.

United Reformed Church (or United Reformed Union)

Presbyterians - a form of church government. Modern Presbyterians trace its institutional roots back to the Scottish Reformation. Roots of Presbyterianism lie in the European Reformation of the 16th Century, with the example of John Calvin's Geneva being particularly influential. Presbyterian theology typically emphasises the Sovereignty of God, a high regard for the authority of the Bible, and an emphasis on the necessity of grace (i.e. unearned favours of mercy received from God) through faith in Christ. In 1966 the Presbyterian united with the Congregational to become the United Reformed. Presbyterian Church of Ireland. Congregationalist Union of Scotland. Presbyterian Free. Presbyterian Relief: (1761-1847).

Congregational churches are Protestant (that separated from the Roman Catholic Church) Christian Churches practicing Congregationalist governance, in which each congregation independently and autonomously runs its own affairs. The early Congregationalists were called Separatists or Independents to distinguish themselves from the similarly Calvinistic Presbyterians. The reforms advocated a return to the simplicity and sincerity they saw described in the New Testament Church. 8 Sep 1809 Congregational Union. In 1966 the Congregational united with the Presbyterian to become the United Reformed Church (re-formed, not reformed as in rehabilitated). Local Congregations are governed by Presbyteries made up of representatives of the local congregations. Refer also to Calvinism.

United Reformed Church (1966 & ongoing): The United Reformed Church is a Trinitarian church with strong roots in the Presbyterian (Reformed and Calvinist) and Congregational traditions.

The first meeting of the United Reformed Church in England and Wales was on 5th October 1972. It had been formed by the Union of the Presbyterian Church of England and most of the Congregational Churches in England and Wales. In 1981 the U R C was to be joined by the Churches of Christ, becoming the United Reformed Church in the United Kingdom. In 2000 union with the Churches of the Congregational Union of Scotland took place, the resulting Church being called the United Reformed Church.

United Secession (1820-47) : no information currently

Universalists

Walloon

A descendant of the ancient Belgae, a race of a mixed Celtic and Roman stock now forming the French speaking section of the population of Belgium.

The Parish Registers of Herefordshire, published © 1987 and © 1988 by The Friends of Hereford Record Office, edited by Mr **John Harnden**, B.Sc., provided parish names, Hundred, Deanery and some Nonconformist. The Lewis referred to is "Lewis's Topographical Dictionary of England." Thank you also (2008) to John Harden for rebuilt and restoration dates, which he gleaned from "The Builder, "The Guardian" and "The Ecclesiologist" 1852-78.

During 2008 © Mr J Harnden also supplies a list of 'Places of Worship' gleaned from the following areas [Jag: and any new detail added to the foregoing]:-

1851 Ecclesiastical Census - supposedly lists all places of worship of all denominations. Not included were the two parishes in the Newent District, four parishes in Tenbury, four in Monmouth, two hamlets in Cwmyoy parish in Abergavenny District, and five townships in Knighton District. The location, date of erection or foundation and size of congregation are shown, but it is said that the information is incomplete because of the ignorance or reluctance of the informant. The census record itself notes that nine returns in the Sollers Hope sub-district of the Ross District are missing. These records are at the PRO Kew under H0129/346-352, 602 and 603. A copy of the Herefordshire section can be found at the Herefordshire Record Office on microfilms X107 and X108. Victoria Jane Robinson - "As with all censuses there was some 'free expression when completing the forms but at least they seem to be the originals not enumerators transcriptions. They were called for to quantify the church-going population. On a national level it was found that (very roughly) a third did not attend a religious service, a third went to the parish church and the last third were non-conformist - the Church of England got worried!" Victoria states she didn't included any figures - "some of the congregations were as small as twenty people for all services on the Sunday. Several commented that attendance was down on that particular Sunday because of a 'local festival' known as Mothering Sunday) one that many of his congregation were at a funeral at a neighbouring church/chapel.]"

Directories - Herefordshire Record Office has over thirty local directories dating from 1784 to 1967, but it is not until about 1850 that information regarding Nonconformist places of worship is included. The 1851, 1867 and 1876 directories have been used for the extraction of relevant information. Here again there are probable omissions and errors. [Mr Harnden kindly supplied a copy of his list and it was checked against the foregoing October 2008].

Surrendered Nonconformist Registers at the PRO - Under the Non Parochial Act of 1840 all Nonconformist Registers were required to be surrendered to the Registrar General. Many such registers (4304) were deposited, with the initial non-compliance of Catholics and Quakers. In 1857 a further 267 Registers were received. In 1859 a consolidated list was published. This is available in the PRO Kew under RG4, and also RG6 for the Quaker deposits. The Herefordshire section is available on microfilm at Herefordshire Record Office on X70. A typescript version by M. Faraday, with index, is on the open shelves.

Herefordshire Record Office : Deposited Registers - There is a large variety of Nonconformist registers deposited as well as a quantity of associated material. Comprehensive lists of all such items deposited are in the Nonconformist file on the catalogue shelves. Also, "L31/1 Property in the Hereford Circuit of the Wesleyan Chapel" which is useful for identifying the location of the properties, and when they were acquired or built. Surveys made in 1911, 1921 and 1935. Also, "L31/2 State of the Methodist Societies in the Herefordshire Mission", surveys made in 1915 and 1920, and is useful for identifying which chapels were extant at those times.

The first monumental inscription recording to be received, after writing out to various parties, (Women's Institute, Local History Societies, etc.), was Moreton Jeffreys during January 1987. In the meantime the recording of Tupsley (started by others during unknown period), was handed to author of this document and so checking commenced during the same year, with a reference number of 21, being finalised Nov 1987. Initially checking was by self, but then Mr John Harden discovered I working there once a week after work on my own, and so joined me. We were later joined by others, and the "Graveyard Grovelling" team began, with a variety of people joining and leaving over the years, at our height having 14 recorders for a few years. The latter few years mostly eight to ten of us finalised the recording project during 2015/16, with typing continuing until 2016.
